QLD Children in State Care Reparations Scheme 2007 - 2008	In May 2007, the Queensland Government established a redress scheme with funding of up to \$100 million. The Scheme provided two levels of payments: 7,400 people were assessed as eligible for a level 1 payment of between \$7,000 to \$40,000, of those 4,500 applicants were offered an additional payment ranging from \$6,000 to \$33,000 for applicants who suffered more serious abuse or neglect.
