*Preventing and responding to child sexual abuse*

- Initiatives to support First Nations victim-survivors of child sexual abuse must be culturally appropriate and trauma-informed.
- The National Indigenous Australians Agency is implementing two measures under the *National Strategy to Prevent and Respond to Child Sexual Abuse 2021-2030*:
  - a trauma aware, healing informed, and culturally appropriate resource to improve early disclosure experiences and access to specialist services for First Nations victim-survivors.
  - First Nations healing approaches for victim-survivors of child sexual abuse and their families (Supporting Healing for Families).
- The *National Strategy* addresses key recommendations of the *Royal Commission into Institutional Responses into Child Sexual Abuse* and was developed in partnership with state and territory governments, and in consultation with hundreds of stakeholders. Its implementation is led by the National Office for Child Safety within the Attorney-General's Department.

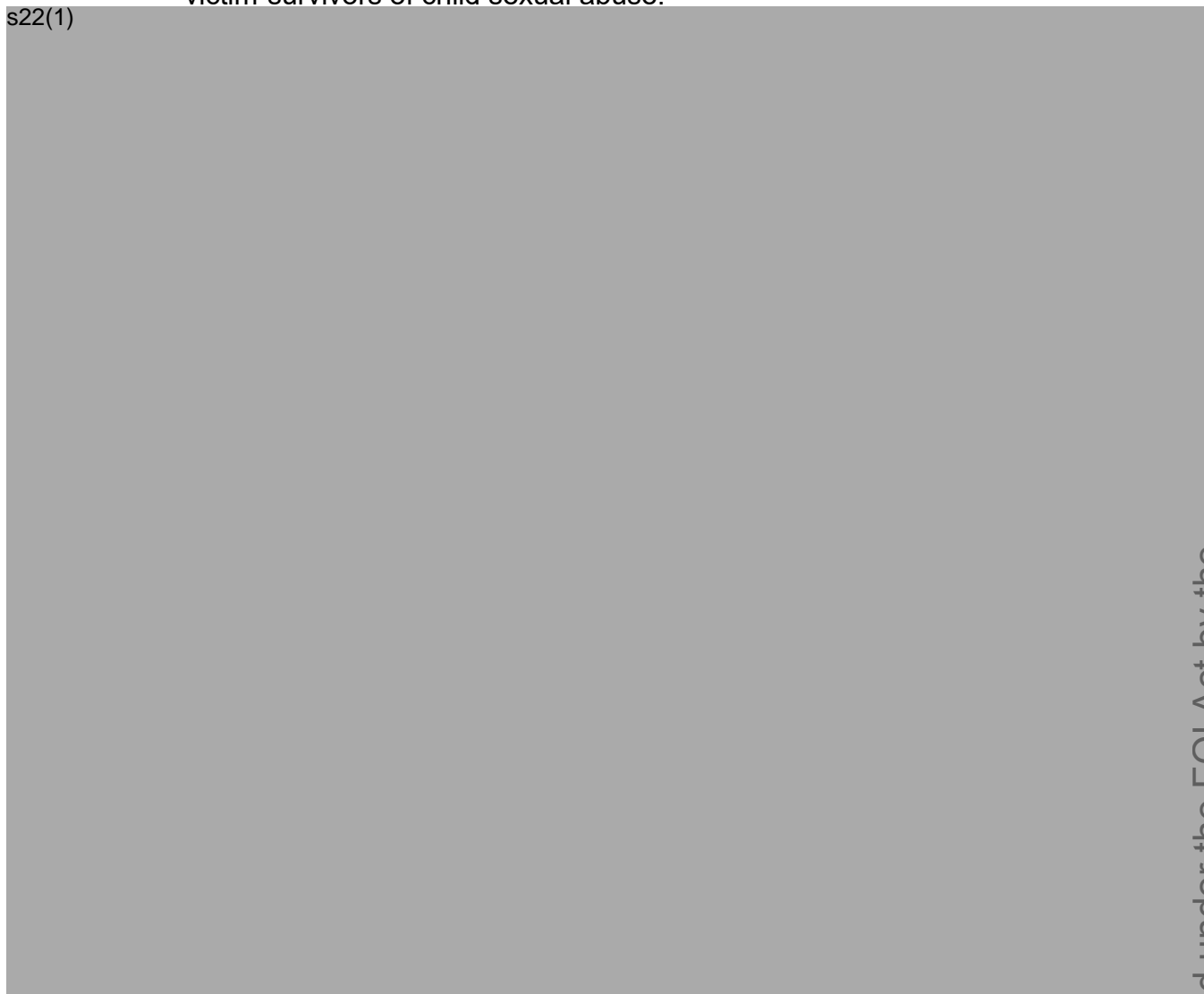

### *Healing programs*

- Under the National Strategy to Prevent and Respond to Child Sexual Abuse, the NIAA received:
  - \$10.9 million over four years (2021-25) for the Supporting Healing for Families program to deliver First Nations-led, place-based healing services for First Nations survivors of child sexual abuse and their families in 5 locations across Australia.
    - An Indigenous Expert Group oversights co-design and implementation of the healing approaches. The group includes SNAICC, The Healing Foundation, Gayaa Dhuwi Australia, and NACCHO.
  - \$3.8 million over 4 years (2021-2025) to partner with First Nations experts to design, pilot and evaluate a trauma-aware, healing-informed and culturally appropriate national training package and resources to improve early disclosures by, and access to specialist services for, First Nations victim-survivors of child sexual abuse.


*National Strategy to Prevent and Respond to Child Sexual Abuse*

- \$10.9 million over 4 years (2021-25) for Supporting Healing for Families - to co-design, deliver and evaluate First Nations-led, place-based healing services for First Nations survivors of child sexual abuse and their families.
  - The funding is available in up to 5 locations – Alice Springs, Northern Territory; Derby, Western Australia; Latrobe, Victoria; Metro West Adelaide, South Australia; and Townsville, Queensland.
  - An Indigenous Expert Group (IEG) of First Nations expert's oversights co-design and implementation of the healing approaches. The group includes SNAICC – National Voice for Our Children, The Healing Foundation, Gayaa Dhuwi (Proud Spirit) Australia, and NACCHO.
- \$3.8 million over 4 years (2021-2025) to design, pilot and evaluate a trauma-aware, healing-informed and culturally appropriate national training package and resources in partnership with First Nations experts for frontline health care workers. The training and resources will improve

early disclosure experiences of, and access to specialist services for, First Nations victim-survivors of child sexual abuse.

- The NIAA has engaged SNAICC – National Voice for Our Children to deliver the co-designed service models for the Supporting Healing for Families program in the 5 locations and to develop the training package and resources for health work capability building.

Status of States and Territories Reparations/Redress Schemes/Class Actions

Other Schemes assisting some members of the Stolen Generations: for abuse or neglect only, <u>not removal</u>	
National Redress Scheme for people who have experienced institutional child sexual abuse 2018 - 2028	<p>The National Redress Scheme was created in response to the <i>Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse</i>, which estimated that 60,000 people experienced institutional child sexual abuse in Australia.</p> <p>The Scheme provides support to people who experienced institutional child sexual abuse with access to counselling (a minimum of 20 hours of counselling over recipient's lifetime), a direct personal response, and a Redress payment (range from <b>less than \$10,000 through to \$150,000</b>).</p>
WA Children in State Care Reparations Scheme 2007 - 2011	<p>On 17 December 2007, the Western Australian Government announced the establishment of the \$114 million Redress WA Scheme to provide adults who, as children, were abused or neglected in state care in Western Australia.</p>

	<p>The Redress WA Scheme includes access to counselling services, an ex gratia payment and an apology. Initially, the <u>maximum payment</u> under the scheme was to be \$80,000 but that was subsequently reduced to \$45,000.</p> <p>By June 2010, Redress WA had paid over \$117 million (across four different payment levels) to eligible applicants from 5,225 offers.</p>
<b>QLD Children in State Care Reparations Scheme 2007 - 2008</b>	<p>In May 2007, the Queensland Government established a redress scheme with funding of up to \$100 million. The Scheme provided two levels of payments:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• 7,400 people were assessed as eligible for a level 1 payment of between \$7,000 to \$40,000, of those</li><li>• 4,500 applicants were offered an additional payment ranging from \$6,000 to \$33,000 for applicants who suffered more serious abuse or neglect.</li></ul>

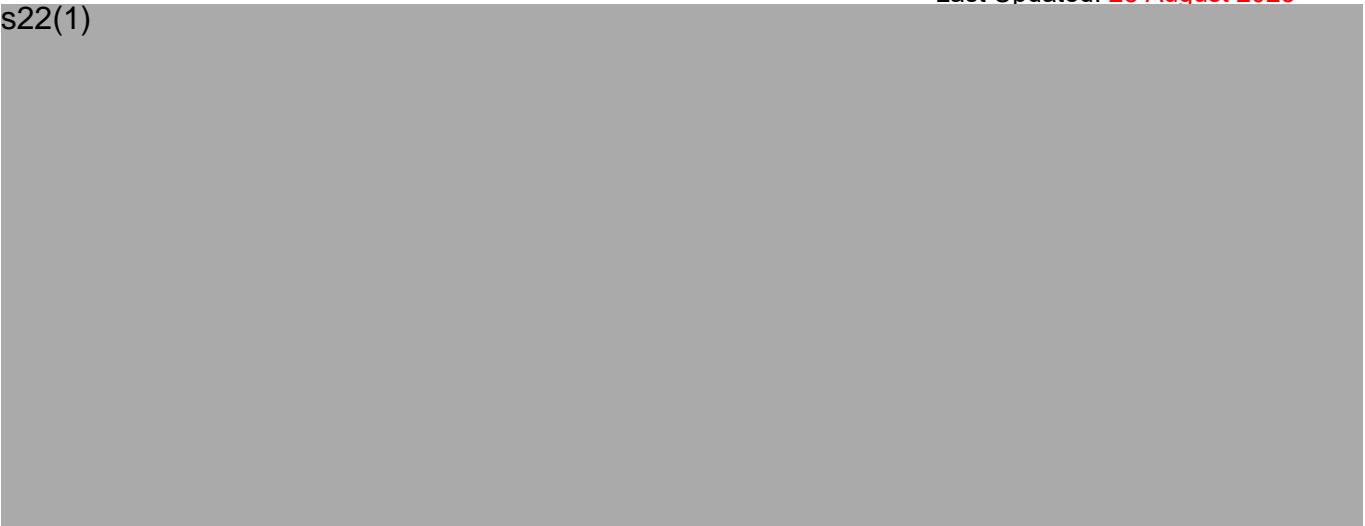

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

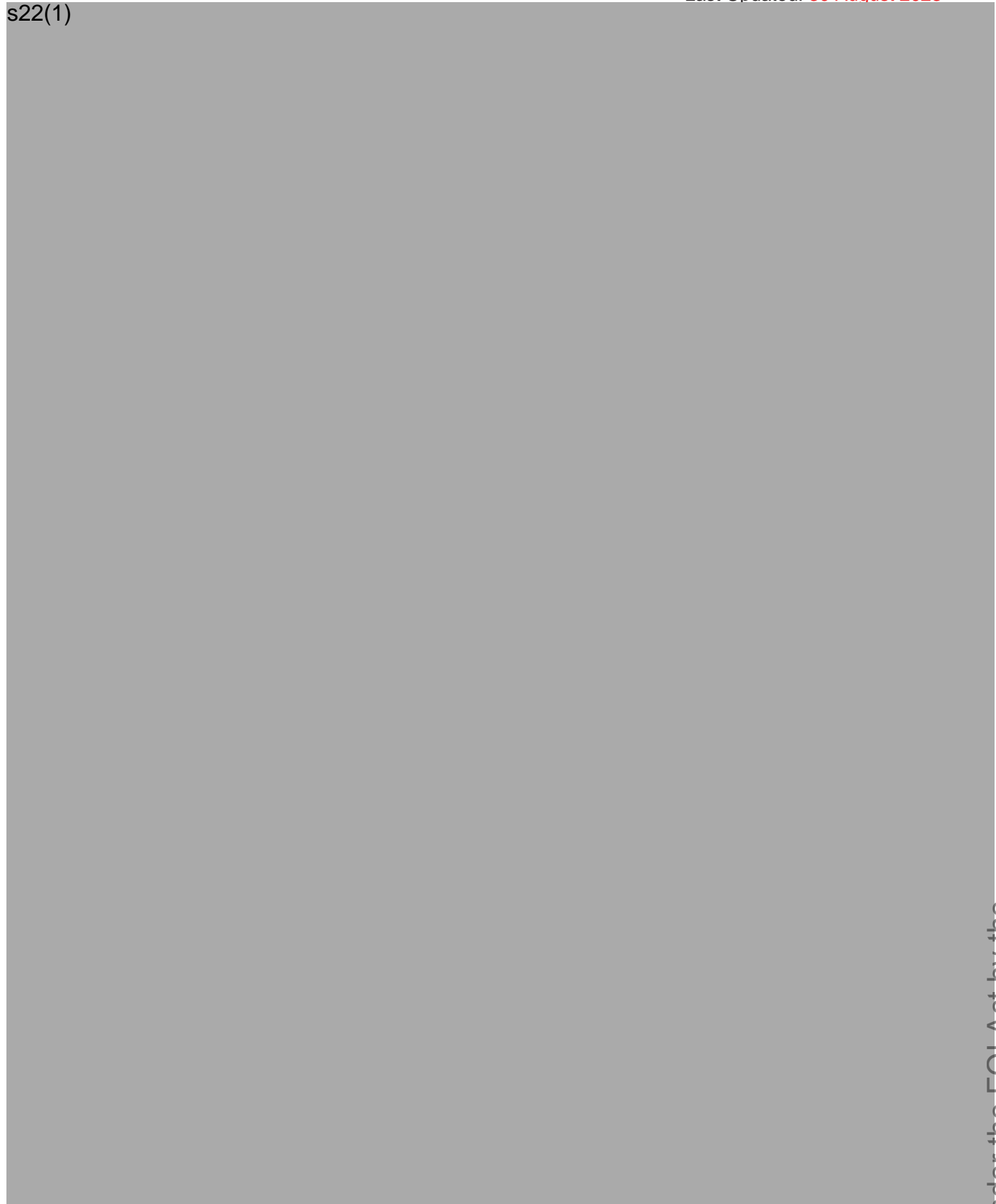
